The National Parks are home to complex communities of plants and animals that have developed over time. Native species evolve in concert with other species and thus are adapted to their local environment. The cards enclosed in this packet depict plants native to America's Heartland.

Natural forces and geography have kept plants within their native ranges. When plants are moved outside of their distinct habitats they may become disruptive to other plant species or biological communities
